## **UN SECRETARY-GENERAL'S REPORT**

The world is reaching an inflection point: If significant investments are not made <u>now</u>, the increase in premature mortality from NCDs in low-income and lower-middle-income countries will not be offset by gains due to progress in implementing commitments made by 2030.

- Progress across the board is uneven and insufficient; calls for bolder commitments and make recommendations on key NCD Alliance campaign priorities, e.g. urgent need for greater investment for NCDs and scaling-up implementation of WHO's Best Buys;
- Calls for greater attention to the inclusion of mental health in the NCD response;
- Key barriers to progress, incl. weak political action at the highest level / lack of policy coherence, insufficient integration of NCDs into national development plans;
- Emphasis on need to address commercial determinants, incl. industry nterference and the impact of upstream economic, investment and trade policies.

## **UN SECRETARY-GENERAL'S REPORT**

## **Recommendations (para 50-79):**

Commit at the highest political level and facilitate international cooperation to:

- Pursue policy coordination and coherence between public health and economic policies;
- Prioritize implementation of WHO's Best Buys;
- Dissolve disease-specific silos to develop universal health coverage approaches to include publicly financed package of health services including NCDs and mental health;
- Increase significantly investment in national NCD responses;
- Redouble efforts to engage sectors beyond health;
- Reinforce the role of non-State Actors;

# Updates from New York The Road to the 2018 High-Level Meeting

#### **Modalities Resolution**

- Final informal meetings to agree the <u>modalities resolution</u> took place Monday 26th and Tuesday 27th March at UNHQ
- Agreement on date (Thursday 27 September) & theme of the HLM
  - Overall theme: Scaling up multistakeholder and multisectoral responses to the prevention and control of noncommunicable diseases, in the context of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development
  - Multistakeholder panel themes:
    - 1. Strengthening health systems and financing for the prevention and control of NCDs, on each country's path towards achieving Universal Health Coverage, including through sharing evidence-based best practices, scientific knowledge and lessons learned
    - 2. Opportunities and challenges in engaging governments, civil society, and the private sector at the global, regional, and national levels to promote multisectoral partnerships for the prevention and control of NCDs, and the promotion of healthy lifestyles



# Updates from New York The Road to the 2018 High-Level Meeting

### **Modalities Resolution, cont.**

- Interactive hearing to take place before the end of July 2018
  - Civil society, parliamentarians, philanthropic foundations, academia, private sector, medical associations, UN agencies, Member States, etc.
- Next steps: modalities resolution text will be sent to UN budgetary committee for approval at their meeting in early May

## **Outcome Document Negotiations**

- Will likely begin in May 2018 and continue through July 2018
- Key time for advocacy with MS (in capitol & NY) to share civil society priorities
- NCDA to produce a shadow outcome document to guide OD advocacy



  - Broad ranging discussions and suggestions, beyond 4x4
  - Short list of 24 recommendations emerging from discussions to be produced
- 26<sup>th</sup> March: Second virtual meeting of the commission
  - Commissioners agreed that recommendations should be evidence-based, transformative, actionable, and innovative







- Raise taxes on sugar-sweetened beverages to reduce sugar



ACTIVITY

- · Promote physical activity with mass media campaigns and oth community based education, motivational and environmental programs
- · Provide physical activity counselling and referral as part of routi primary health care



**CARDIOVASCULAR** DISEASE

- Provide drug therapy and counselling for eligible persons at high risk to prevent heart attacks and strokes
- Treat new cases of acute myocardial infarction with either acetylsalicylic acid and clopidogrel, or thrombolysis, or primary percutaneous coronary interventions
- Treat acute ischemic stroke with intravenous thrombolytic
- Prevent rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease by increasing treatment of streptococcal pharyngitis at primary care level and developing a register of patients who receive regular prophylactic penicillin



#### CANCER

- Prevent cervical cancer by:
- vaccinating girls aged 9-13 years against human papillomavirus
- screening women aged 30-49 years, with the Pap smear, or human papillomavirus test, or visual inspection with acetic
- Provide breast cancer screening for women aged 50-69 years. with mammography linked to timely diagnosis and treatment
- Provide surgery, chemotherapy and radiotherapy treatment
- Provide home-based and hospital-based palliative care services




RESPIRATORY DISEASE

- Provide symptom relief for patients with asthma, and for patients with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, with inhaled salbutamol
- Provide treatment for patients with asthma, using low dose inhaled beclometasone and short acting beta agonist








## Presence of NCDs in national plans and commissions

# **Multisectoral initiatives** in the Americas



## WHO Global Conference on Noncommunicable Diseases October, 2017. Montevideo, Uruguay

#### Goal

To highlight the critical links between reducing premature deaths from NCDs and enhancing policy coherence across areas that impact the governance, prevention, management and surveillance of NCDs.



## Montevideo Roadmap 2018-2030 on NCDs

- Reinvigorate political action
- Enable health systems to respond more effectively to NCDs
- Increase significantly the financing of national NCD responses and international cooperation
- Increase efforts to engage sectors beyond health
- Reinforce the role of non-state actors
- Seek measures to address the negative impact of products and environmental factors harmful for health and strengthen the contribution and accountability of the private sector and other non-State actors
- Continue relying on WHO's leadership and key role in the global response to NCDs
- Act in unity





## **Inter-American Task Force on NCDs**















A strategic alliance of Inter-American organizations and associated international institutions and agencies, to address prevention and control of NCDs and their related risk factors in the Americas aims to:

- Support Member States in strengthening their national capacities for NCD policies and programs.
- Seek synergies and harmonization among the participating agencies and their relevant activities and strategies.

 Coordinate with the multi-sector NCD actions of related global and regional initiatives.

Declaration of Commitment: Strengthening Prevention and Control of Non-Communicable Diseases Through Cooperative Action of the Inter-American System at the VII Summit of the Americas in 2015



## Inter-American Task Force on NCDs (cont.)

#### Collaborative activities include:

#### NCD investment cases:

- PAHO, WHO and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) have partnered to develop a series of Investment Cases for NCDs in Barbados, Jamaica and Peru.
- Collaboration with WHO, UNDP, IADB and experts to improve investment case tools

#### Taxes for Health:

 Collaboration with partners including the WB, IADB to advance tobacco taxation as a public health measure.

### Multisectoral policy dialogue to prevent obesity:

 Collaboration with WB to establish a multisectoral policy dialogue within and among countries to develop national and sub-regional policies to prevent obesity.





## **Inter-American Task Force on NCDs** (cont.)

 Joint High-level session of the Permanent Council and the Inter-American Council for Integral Development

"Progress, partnerships and the way forward for the response to NCDs in the Americas"



**PAHO Director**, Dr. Etienne: "What has been achieved so far in NCDs prevention is inadequate. Progress depends not only on technical expertise but more importantly on political leadership. National governments working multi-sectorally to put people's health first"





## **Inter-American Task Force on NCDs** (cont.)



The president of Uruguay, Dr. Tabaré Vázquez,

"Only united we can win in this struggle. Only united we can defend the health of our people," he stated.

Ambassador of Barbados, Hon. Selwin Hart,

invited his colleagues to work together on a resolution to be adopted at the OAS General Assembly in June 2018 .

## Other multisectoral collaborations:

## Training on the Economics of Tobacco Control for practitioners, researchers and advocates in Latin America and the Caribbean

- Joint effort of: PAHO, WHO FCTC Secretariat, Campaign for Tobacco Free Kids, American Cancer Society, Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health, University of Chicago at Illinois and the International Development Research Center from Canada.
- With the participation of the Inter-American Development Bank, International Monetary Fund and the World Bank Group.
- Specific highlights of work presented and discussions in the meeting include:
  - New regional-specific independent evidence was presented to counteract tobacco industry arguments against increasing taxes
  - Countries showed advances in efforts to monitor the impact of tobacco taxes on consumption and revenue:
  - The need for new messenger outside the traditional sectors to help to include tobacco taxes in the agenda of fiscal policy makers.





## Other multisectoral collaborations (cont.):

Sub-regional workshop on law and non-Communicable diseases for Caribbean countries.

**Objective:** the use of law as a powerful tool to prevent and control NCDs, focusing on the use of law to regulate NCD risk factors and to defend measures from legal challenges.



Participants from 13 Caribbean countries from:

- Ministries of Health,
- Ministries of Justice/Attorney-General's/Legal Affairs/Parliamentary Counsel,
- Ministries of Industry/Commerce,

as well as participants from:

 CARICOM, CARPHA, OECS, the Caribbean Law Institute Centre, the Caribbean Court of Justice, and University of West Indies.



## Other multisectoral collaborations (cont.):

- Civil society partnerships on NCDs have also expanded in the Region and examples include the Healthy Caribbean Coalition (HCC) and the Healthy Latin American Coalition (CLAS).
- Three Sub-regional multisectoral NCD policy dialogues to promote best practices on integrating NCD policies beyond the health sector implemented.



## Challenges and opportunities

- Good progress with establishing NCD plans in the Americas.
- > It is challenging to engage sectors outside of health, to change policies and regulations that support NCD prevention.
- ➤ More advocacy and sensitization, beyond the health sector is needed. Promote all of government and all of society approaches to scale up NCD prevention efforts.
- > The 3<sup>rd</sup> UNHLM on NCDs is a great opportunity to accelerate the multi-sector NCD response.


