Financing for NCDs Dialogue

9-11 April, Copenhagen

- Discussed current landscape of financing for NCDs, potential sources of funding, innovative partnerships, etc.
- Resulted in a [high-level summary](#)
- Launch of the *Lancet* Taskforce on NCDs and Economics [series](#)
- *Ongoing challenge*: We know what needs to be done, but the rhetoric has not yet translated into action. Governments and donors are still lagging behind in financing NCDs, and without significant investment, the NCD response will not accelerate at the speed required to meet global goals and targets.

Interactive stakeholder hearing

5 July, UNHQ New York

- Part of the preparatory process for the 3rd UN HLM
- Participation: Member States, UN Agencies, NGOs in consultative status w/ECOSOC, academia, private sector
- Format: 4 panels with opportunities for participants to make statements from the floor
- Over 300 participants - more than in 2011 and 2014
- Voices of civil society + PLWNCDs evident
- *Challenge*: unhealthy commodity industries were represented on panels and in statements from the floor





- Agreement on the '5x5' response - inclusion of air pollution and mental health
- Civil society mobilised - media statements, #enoughNCDs campaign, side events, etc.
- Rising political capital of UHC ahead of the 2019 UN HLM on UHC

Challenges

- No financial commitments to the NCD response
- Accountability a missing link
- Civil society statements from the floor were limited
- Unhealthy commodity industries active throughout negotiations and undermined ambitious language in text on WHO Best Buys & other policies
- 7 years until the next HLM in 2025

Air pollution: a major cause of disease, silent killer of millions

Air pollution is the world's largest single environmental health risk, and a leading risk factor for NCDs. According to the WHO, air pollution causes 7 million deaths every year worldwide.¹ Of these deaths, about 80% are from noncommunicable diseases (NCDs), making the number of NCD deaths due to air pollution comparable to mortality due to tobacco use.² Air pollution negatively affects quality of life for all, and in particular for billions of people around the world living with NCDs.

Every year poor air quality claims 4.2 million lives from exposure to ambient (outdoor) pollution primarily from industry, agriculture, energy and transport, and 3.8 million from household (indoor) pollution largely generated by burning household fuel for cooking, heating and lighting purposes.^{3,4} Air pollution is the fourth highest risk factor for premature deaths – one in 10 deaths worldwide is attributable to air pollution exposure.⁵ In 2016, over 90% of the world's population lived in places where the air is unsafe to breathe, according to the World Health Organization's air quality guidelines.⁶



Ambient air pollution alone is responsible for:

- 24% of all deaths from **stroke**
- 25% of all deaths and disease from **ischaemic heart disease**
- 29% of all deaths and disease from **lung cancer**
- 43% of all deaths and disease from **chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD)**.⁷

There is also increasing evidence for links with other NCDs. The suffering and costs imposed on people, families, communities, businesses, and economies are entirely preventable by cleaning up our air.

For these reasons, the UN has recently recognised air pollution as one of the major risk factors contributing to the massive and growing burden of NCDs worldwide, alongside tobacco, alcohol, unhealthy diet and physical inactivity. The Political Declaration of the third UN High Level Meeting on NCDs was signed by Heads of State and Government during the UN General Assembly in September 2018.

The recognition of air pollution as a major risk factor should be the starting signal for a new, more urgent policy approach to clean up our air to protect and improve health for all worldwide. There is an undeniable imperative for the NCD community to support policies and measures to reduce indoor and outdoor air pollution as a matter of grave urgency.

In the context of the global movement to achieve universal health coverage (UHC), action to prevent diseases - including by reducing air pollution - is all the more important to reduce the burden of disease and bring UHC within reach.

UNFCCC COP 24

- Ongoing in Katowice, Poland, from December 3 to 15
- Negotiations centred on discussion of the 'Paris Rulebook' - the implementing guidelines of the [Paris Agreement](#), adopted in 2015 at COP 21
- Central aim of the Paris Agreement is to **keep global temperature rise well below 2.0 °C above pre-industrial levels - and ideally within 1.5°C**. Requests each country to outline and communicate their post-2020 climate actions, known as 'Nationally Determined Contributions' (NDCs).
- **Hot topics** within negotiation of Paris Rulebook include
 - Financing
 - Transparency
 - Human rights, gender, indigenous peoples




UNFCCC COP 24: Health in the Dialogue

- Health discussions at COP 24 spanned **NCDs and co-benefit solutions**, as well as impacts on infectious disease, malnutrition, health system adaptation and resilience, and the role of health professionals as advocates
- Key publications launched in advance of and at the meeting
 - Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) special report: the **1.5 Health Report**: “Any increase in global warming, **even an increase by half a degree**, could affect human health. Warming of 1.5°C is not considered ‘safe’ for most nations, communities, ecosystems and sectors and poses significant risks to natural and human systems.”
 - 2018 Report of the Lancet Countdown on Health and Climate Change - **Lancet Paper** and **accompanying resources: 10 recommendations for action**, as well as headline finding that **153 billion hours of labour were lost in 2017 because of heat**, an increase of more than 62 billion hours since 2000
 - WHO-led **COP 24 Special Report on Health and Climate Change**: Meeting the targets of the **Paris agreement would be expected to save over one million lives a year from air pollution alone by 2050**, and the value of the health gains would be double the cost of the policies - even greater gains if 1.5°C rather than the 2.0 °C target - up to 2.31 trillion USD in China and 8.4 trillion in India.
 - Joint briefing for UNFCCC Negotiators on **Incorporating Health into the Climate Regime** coordinated by the Global Climate and Health Alliance

• Many instances of health community ‘talking to itself’, but also examples of wider integration, including in conversations around a ‘Just Transition’ to a sustainable economy



UNFCCC COP 24: Influence of the Industry

- Strong industry presence - stark contrast to tobacco COPs
- COP24's [first corporate sponsor was the EU's largest producer of coking coal](#) (JSW), who said the partnership would guarantee “the company’s active participation in the event and the possibility of promoting pro-ecological changes in the mining sector”
- [US Side Event](#) on new fossil fuel technologies “**We strongly believe that no country should have to sacrifice economic prosperity or energy security in pursuit of environmental sustainability**” (and similar events by other Member States)
- Wider evidence of parallels to tactics used by big tobacco, big alcohol, and big sugar
- Protests by civil society in the COP 24 venue and in the streets of Katowice


- Country Updates:**
 - Kenya: A mobile platform to address NCDs** - NCD Alliance Kenya (NCDAK) embraces digital health technology to promote education on NCD detection, prevention, diagnosis and management. The initial focus is on CVD, diabetes, cancer and epilepsy, and will expand to mental health.
 - Sri Lanka had #ENOUGH and spread the word via the tuk-tuk** - The #Enough campaign resonated with Sri Lankans' call for their right to health during the Global Week for Action on NCDs, spawning a video and the use of stickers. Now, traditional "tuk-tuk" taxis in Colombo continue to spread the word!
 - Ghana: Empowering people living with NCDs for a stronger NCD response** - The Ghana NCD Alliance and NCDA co-hosted an Our Views, Our Voices meeting that convened nearly 90 PLWNCD, civil society, government and private sector stakeholders, aiming to provide a platform for those living with NCDs.
 - Mexico: Developing the Advocacy Agenda of People Living with NCDs** - As part of NCDA's Our Views, Our Voices programme, NCDA supported the Mexico Salud-Hable coalition to convene a meeting of 60 PLWNCDs. Participants discussed and developed a Mexican Advocacy Agenda of PLWNCD.
- Featured:**
 - Reflecting on the 2018 UN High-Level Meeting on NCDs** - The third UN High-Level Meeting (HLM) on NCDs took place almost three months ago, on 27 September, during the week of the UN General Assembly in New York. The 2018 Political Declaration of Heads of State and Governments has expanded on the language of the 2011 and 2014 Outcome Documents on NCDs in important ways – including the integration of mental health, air pollution, and the importance of working with civil society and people living with and affected by NCDs – but it fell short in getting new and substantive time-bound commitments from governments.
- Global Updates:**
 - NCD Countdown 2030: First report out!** - NCDA is a proud partner of NCD Countdown 2030, a collaboration with The Lancet, WHO and Imperial College London, as well as with technical experts from international institutions. In addition, Countdown 2030 offers a mechanism for independent accountability.
 - Global Conference on Primary Healthcare (PHC)** - NCDA participated in several panels at the Global Conference on PHC, and organised a café session focused on putting people at the centre of health care. During the conference, a second declaration emphasising the critical role of PHC around the world was adopted.
- Partners Updates:**
 - Last week: 2018 World Congress of Cardiology & Cardiovascular Health** - The World Heart Federation returned to Dubai for the 2018 World Congress of Cardiology & Cardiovascular Health, with an outstanding line-up of world experts and with a new Meet & Share Forum to share best practices and identify key challenges among civil society advocates.
 - New global review of cancer and NCD plans shows progress in prevention** - In collaboration with WHO and the International Cancer Control Partnership (ICCP), UICC coordinated a global review of national cancer control plans. The review showed the importance of national cancer control and NCD plans in providing strategic direction and driving action.

Additional highlights include: "The Mozambique NCD alliance was just launched to address NCD risk factors at national level" and "Personal reflections on the UN HLM on NCDs by NCDA Policy Director".


